Our history of having few complaints about officer conduct has not occurred by accident. In these times more than ever, we are fortunate to have the incredible quality of employees that we have.

Given how crazy the last four months have been, I hope all of you find some time to get away from the job and relax this summer.

While travel certainly won't look the same as in years past, it's more important than ever for employees to take care of themselves and recharge the batteries. Never have your vacations been more deserved!

Fire




Police




Parks & Rec


Fleet worked in shifts to maintain vehicles for all departments and emergency personnel. Engineering operated digitally to conduct inspections as projects continued to move forward. Building

Administrative staff continued to process paperwork.


Water and Sewer responded to water main breaks and emergencies. Streets employees played a key role in helping Parks and Forestry crews get the beach ready to reopen.


