iews from the desk of ...

Dear Employees:

One year ago, the budget message for the City Council reflected on the great economic uncertainty that lay ahead. Today, the economy is declining and very volatile. The City, like all communities, faces significant challenges brought on by the worldwide recession. Fortunately, through historically prudent financial management, Lake Forest is well positioned to operate and continue providing quality services during these wearisome and economically stormy times.

The convergence of economic, operational and structural factors will require some sacrifice. Rising unemployment, business closings, home foreclosures and declining consumer confidence has resulted in a reduction in City revenues and increased pressure to scrutinize public expenditures. These pressures and challenges will necessitate change. The recession will have a long-term, profound effect on residents in ways that we cannot even imagine. It will also have an effect on the way the City does business – thus requiring a new way of thinking. Consequently, the proposed FY10 Budget focuses on completing major capital initiatives already underway; comprehensively evaluating and prioritizing all City services; examining opportunities to increase program efficiencies; and remaining positive and optimistic about future economic forecasts.

During FY10, the City Council, City staff and residents will systematically evaluate and prioritize all City services as either a Core City Service ("mission"-critical) or Elective City Service (enhances quality of life). This process will be comprehensive, inclusive and most importantly, enduring – thereby insuring that any future budget reductions or elimination of programs is properly aligned with resident expectations. The key will be to develop a sustainable list of community priorities absent any individual pet projects or staff biases. The time has come when the City Council and staff must examine the services offered to residents and the cost-benefit of providing such services. We are in the service-delivery business, and a periodic analysis of what services we currently offer and their associated costs is critical and wise financial planning.

During troubled or uncertain economic times, it is even more critical that the City take a proactive role in examining the ways it does business. We must focus on future challenges and opportunities that would otherwise not present themselves. "Business as usual" cannot handcuff creativity or blind us from potentially restructuring operations, forming partnerships or other strategies that control costs and maintain desired service levels.

On a regular basis, the City examines its operations to determine if there is a better or more cost-effective way of providing service to residents. In FY10, the City will focus on the following five programs:

- 1. Fire Service Consolidation or Shared Services
- 2. IT Service Consolidation or Shared Services
- 3. Fleet Efficiency Study
- 4. Green Industry Consolidation
- 5. Continued Participation in IRMA

With declining revenues, the proposed FY10 operating expenses had to be reduced in order to balance the budget and be in compliance with the City's Fiscal Policies. Some tough and unpopular decisions had to be made, and others potentially loom on the horizon.

As we move forward, I will continue to keep the employees informed of what is happening. Look for the schedule of City Manager Informational Meetings in April, when I will have more concrete information to share.

In the meantime, continue doing your usual good jobs, think creatively and share your ideas. Together we can emerge from these stormy times as a better, stronger organization.

ICMA-RC Goes Paperless

ICMA-RC, the vendor for our deferred compensation and Retirement Health Savings (RHS) programs, is developing a "Go Paperless" campaign to encourage participants to join in reducing paper usage. Their Go Paperless campaign will launch in the coming weeks and is designed to encourage participants to access their financial communications online rather than receive them in the mail.

You can choose to access your quarterly statements and transaction confirmations from ICMA-RC online when you log into Account Access. Online access offers a secure way for participants to view these and other documents, and it helps to reduce opportunities for identity theft.

RHS Beneficiary Fix

Legislation that would remedy the RHS beneficiary issue that went into effect January 1, 2009, is expected to be reintroduced in the House and Senate in the next few months. There is a provision of this legislation that would fix current beneficiary regulations that prohibit anyone who is not a spouse or dependent from receiving assets. This would cover ICMA-RC's RHS program. Employees currently contribute 1% of salary to the RHS program. Congressional support through new cosponsors for this bill continues to grow, thereby increasing its prospects for inclusion in a larger tax or health bill in this Congress.

RTA/CTA Transit Benefit Raised

As part of The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, the RTA/CTA Transit Benefit Fare Program pretax limit has been raised from \$115 per month to \$230 per month. Waukegan Tire Offers Employee Group Purchase Program

We are very happy to announce that Waukegan Tire is now offering City employees wholesale pricing and savings on tires and merchandise, and a 10% savings on automotive services, labor and parts.

To participate in this program, you must first obtain a discount card from the Human Resources Department. When you present the card for use at one of the four Waukegan Tire locations, the store will keep the card. But that doesn't mean you can only use this benefit one time. You just need to get a new card from Human Resources each time you need one. The employee doesn't need to be present to use the card; spouses may use it as well. The only stipulation is that the employee must request the card from Human Resources. Happy driving!


News You Can Use

Aflac NOW Card Update

The Aflac NOW card is a new benefit this year for employees participating in the Section 125 Flexible Spending Account (FSA). Some employees have begun receiving letters from AFLAC requesting copies of receipts. Here is clarification on those receipt requests. As stated during open enrollment, you may be required to submit your receipts for unreimbursed medical FSA expenses when you use this card. However, this will be necessary only if requested in writing by Aflac. This will occur if your expense is for an unusual amount and not for a standard copay amount. If a pharmacy or mail-in service does not keep an "inventory ID approval system", that might generate a letter requesting a receipt. This is a way of verifying that your purchases for medical, dental and vision care expenses are validated and reimbursed appropriately. Always keep your receipts!

If you receive a letter requesting that you submit a receipt, you should respond by faxing in the receipt(s) for the particular expense in question along with the letter you received. The fax number is 877-353-9256. Please note that the letter's language may sound a little strong. This is a government-regulated form letter, so do not be alarmed. Aflac is following the federal guidelines, making sure all purchases and expenses are valid for the employee and to protect the City in providing the FSA benefit plans.
